#### **Required Texts:**

#### **Course Description:**

This course is an intensive and condensed version of American Sign Language III and IV. As in previous courses, we will continue to emphasize the development of proper ASL grammar, syntax, and vocabulary with emphasis on conversation and narration/storytelling. By the end of the course, students will have extensive practice with narrative expression and comprehension and move into more complex constructions of role shifting and classifier use. Exposure to and

knowledge of Deaf culture via class readings, video presentations, and online engagement with the Deaf community continues to be integral to this course. Successful completion of this course (see course/program requirements) satisfies the last course in the foreign language requirement.

## **Course Objectives:**

To expand basic ASL skills (including expressivity of and receptivity to sign) while increasing vocabulary, practicing proper grammar structure, and improving conversational abilities.

- To continue to recognize and employ the proper grammar and syntax of ASL.
- To continue discussion about aspects of Deaf culture.

#### **Course Requirements and Expectations:**

- 1. No Voice Policy: It is the policy of this instructor that no class member uses his or her voice upon entering the ASL classroom. This is to ensure that ASL (including facial expression and body language) remains the primary method and source for communication. Unlike most other languages, ASL is acquired visually. You must continue your efforts to immerse yourself in the signed modality. The no-voice policy facilitates your sign language acquisition.
- 2. Attendance: Being that learning ASL is an interactive and cumulative process, it is expected that you attend all ASL classes. That said, there may be times when missing class is beyond your control. In those times, it is expected that you contact your instructor using Penn's Course Action Report *before class*, noting your absence and detailing how you will make up any missed material and work. You may miss a total of **ONE** class without penalty. Any classes beyond this will result in a reduction of your **final grade** one half a letter grade.

If you are absent during an exam, you must contact your instructor ahead of time or you will not be able to reschedule the exam.

3. <u>Video Journals and Group narratives:</u> You have two Video Journals in this class. We will post instructions in Canvas assignments. This course requires that you do some peer video assessments of online presentations (synchronous and asynchronous) as well as self-assessments on Video Journal production on Canvas GoReact.

4. Discussion Board Comments and Threads: Students are expected to post questions and comments on Canvas's Discussion Board, typically in response to readings and other assignments. We will often post questions/threads and expect you to comment on them. However, you are welcome (and encouraged) to post your own threads/questions any time.

## **Academic Integrity:**

It is your responsibility to be familiar with the University's Code of Academic Integrity. All instances of academic dishonesty will be referred to the Office of Student Conduct for adjudication, without question.

For this class, some examples of academic dishonesty include--but are not limited to--talking or "whispering" during an exam, copying others' assignments or exam responses, handing in an essay that you--or another person—submitted for a different ASL class.

Furthermore, any talking during class is in direct violation of the ASL Only/No Voice agreement. Any violation of this agreement will be considered counter to the class expectations and will result in a deduction of *half a letter grade* from your *final grade* in this class *for each violation*.

\*\*PLEASE, no gum chewing or eating in recorded projects; these are distracting to the visual presentation of your ASL conversation

**Signing** *outside* **of class:** Because this is an intensive class, you will benefit from as much outside-of-class sign contact and use as possible. **We** *highly* **recommend forming a "study group"**—either as a whole group or in smaller groups—to review the work and to have *natural* conversations in ASL. It is *highly recommended* that you meet **at least two-hours per week** (cumulatively) to practice your signing.

#### **Pair Practice:**

• Every Friday, you will submit a recording of you and a partner in GoReact practicing at least two in-class dialogues (and/or a conversation pertaining to that week's vocabulary and grammar lessons). It does *not* have to be perfect, but should just be evidence that you and a partner practiced outside of class. This should be about 10-15 minutes in length. You will be graded on completion and detail, but not content per se.

#### \*Exams:

In lieu of the regular exams, you will have a **receptive mid-term at the end of week 5** on the Canvas Quizzes that covers Units 14, 15, and 17. *Any missed quizzes and the mid-term cannot be made up unless there is a legitimate (and documented) excuse.* You will have a final exam that covers the last five weeks, Units 9, 11, and 18.

\*Hint/note: the likelihood that some or all the receptive portion of your exam comes from the video practice (workbook) is very good. Please be sure to keep up with your video/workbook, even if we do not collect some of the assignments.\*

In the final week, you will take the exams that are composed of two sections: Receptive and Theory. The Receptive portion is based on class and video/workbook themes and will be presented by your instructor. It may include a video excerpt for analysis/translation. (Receptive part will include Unit 9, 11, and 18). The Theory portion will be part of the written exam and will be based on cultural topics, readings, presentations, and handouts from the semester. (Theory part will include Unit 9, 11, and 18.)

Video Journal, Dialogue, and Research Presentation: You will be asked to video record yourself in for the aforementioned assignments. You will be given the assignments either in class or they will be posted on Canvas. You will be expected to hand in the assignment within the specified timelines. (Due date is specified on Canvas).
Self-Assessments/Reflection: You will be required to monitor and analyze your signing and improvements made in your sign production throughout this class. These analyses will

include any feedback you get from me, your peers, and any points you've noticed yourself along the way. It will also include analysis of any interactions you have with members of the Deaf community. The self-reflection paper will be due at the beginning of the final exam class period. You will include details from these self-assessments in your Final Self-Assessment for the class.

Conversation with Instructor: The link will send out during semester to have a conversation with instructor on specific time outside of class time. The interview is a conversation/discussion covers all topics from the summer courses. Worth 10% of the final grade.

## **ASL Sequence Promotion/Exit Policy:**

It is the policy of the ASL department that you must receive a **C minus** or better in your ASL course in order to move on to the next level of ASL. For students who are taking the course Pass/Fail, you will still need to meet this criterion to move on, but if you satisfy the University policy for receiving credit for the class, you will receive credit regardless of whether you meet the C minus minimum. Any student who does not meet the C minus requirement for promotion to the next level will be required to repeat the course until the C minus average for the course is attained.

This policy also applies to fourth semester (ASLD 074) ASL students who wish to exit the program and receive recognition as having met the language requirement. If you do not receive a C minus or better in the fourth semester of the course, you have not satisfied the ASL Department's criteria for meeting the language requirement with ASL. You will be required to repeat the course until you attain a C-minus average.
