COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is a general introduction to linguistics, defined as the science whose domain of investigation is the nature of (human and natural) language. The course contains overviews of the main areas that contribute to the understanding of language, such as phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, and pragmatics. The course also explores some applications of linguistics to fields such as computational linguistics, psycholinguistics, and sociolinguistics.

OBJECTIVES AND REQUIREMENTS

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- Identify and analyze the basic units and structures of language at different levels
- Explain how linguistic data can be collected and used to test hypotheses
- Compare and contrast different languages and dialects in terms of their linguistic features
- Appreciate the diversity and complexity of human language
- Recognize the relevance of linguistics to other disciplines and real-world issues
